

Liturgy of the Word

Why Central?

 Not just old readings → Christ speaks now

- Road to Emmaus:
 - Hearts heavy → Christ opens Scriptures
 - "Were not our hearts burning within us?"
 - Hearts set on fire before eyes opened in the Breaking of Bread



How Readings Are Chosen


3-year Sunday cycle (Matthew, Mark, Luke; John in special seasons)

2-year daily Mass cycle

Almost the whole Bible proclaimed at Mass!

6. Homily






7. Profession of Faith





First Reading


- Proclaimed by the Lector—voice of God's Word
- Stand in the line of the prophets..
- Lectors prepare carefully and prayerfully...

And just as the lector's task is holy, so is ours: to listen with prayerful attention, with hearts ready to receive.




First Reading

- Roots us in the Old Testament, covenant, salvation history
- God has been speaking and acting from the very beginning...
- Connects to the Gospel reading



Responsorial Psalm

- Great liturgical and pastoral importance
- Every human emotion—joy, lament, trust, praise
- Bridge between First Reading & Gospel
- Our prayer back to God in Christ's own words



Second Reading

- Letters of the Apostles (Paul, Peter, John, James...)
- Speaks of the early Church's faith and struggles
- Still relevant for us today



Gospel Acclamation

- Alleluia = joyful welcome
- Procession with Book of the Gospels
- Cross traced on forehead, lips, heart





The Homily

- Breaks open the Word, following Christ's example at Emmaus
- Not about preacher's eloquence, but God's Word
- Prepares us for Eucharist

The Creed

Our shared confession of faith

Unity with the Church across time & space

Solemn bow at the Incarnation words


The Nicene Creed I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Eather and the Son

Our response after hearing God's Word


Intercede for: Church, world, community, those in need

"Lord, hear our prayer"




Word & Sacrament Together

- Liturgy of the Word is not just an introduction
- Word prepares us for Eucharist
- Eucharist sends us to live the Word

 → Eucharist → daily life




•"The Word is life."
