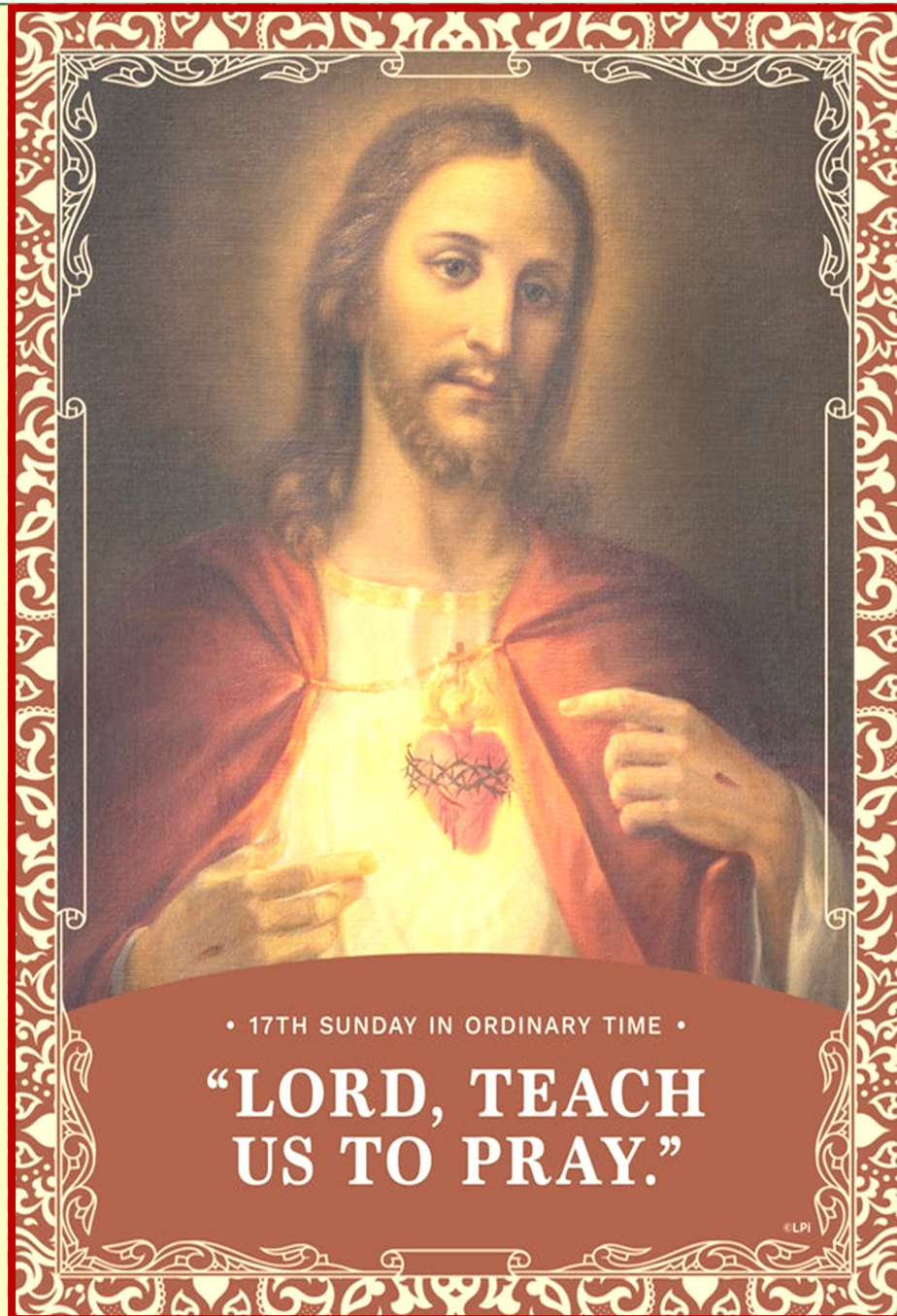

Seventeenth Sunday In Ordinary Time

BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING

Luke gives more attention to Jesus' teachings on prayer than any other Gospel writer. He also mentions Jesus at prayer more than the others. In today's reading, from the beginning of Chapter 11 of his Gospel, Luke presents the core of Jesus' teaching on prayer. It consists of Jesus teaching a prayer to his disciples, a parable on the persistent neighbor, and assurances that God hears our prayers.

The disciples notice Jesus praying "in a certain place." They ask him to teach them to pray just as John the Baptist had taught his disciples. Jesus teaches them a simple version of the most famous Christian prayer, the Our Father, or the Lord's Prayer. Matthew's version shows signs of being shaped by public prayer. Luke's version is probably closer to the original form that Jesus taught. Stripped of much of the language we are used to, Luke's version seems simple and direct. We pray that God's name will be recognized as holy and that his rule over all will be established. This is followed by petitions for our needs for bread, for forgiveness, and for deliverance. Luke uses the more theological language of "sins" rather than "debts," which is used in Matthew's version.

Having taught his disciples a simple, daily prayer, Jesus goes on to reassure them that God answers prayers. First he tells a parable about a persistent neighbor who asks a friend for bread at midnight. The friend is already in bed and has no desire to disturb his family by opening the door. But because the neighbor is persistent, the sleeping man gets up and gives him all that he needs. If a neighbor is willing to help us if we are persistent enough, how could God not respond to our requests?

This teaching concludes with the reminder that if we seek, we will get a response. If a human father, with all his faults, knows how to give good gifts to his children, how much more will our heavenly Father give us? Instead of good gifts, however, Luke substitutes the word *Holy Spirit*. This foreshadows the gift of the Holy Spirit, who is central to Luke's theology and who will play an important role in the growth of the early Church after Pentecost.

The parable and the concluding teaching in this section should not lead us to think of prayer as a series of requests presented to God. Rather, as Jesus teaches in his model prayer, prayer consists in recognizing God's holiness and his rule over all things.

Saints of the Week

Tues, Jul 29: Saints Martha, Mary and Lazarus.

In the household of Bethany, Jesus experienced the family spirit and friendship of Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. Martha, died 1st c.; sister of Mary and Lazarus; model of hospitality and faithful disciple; confessed her faith in Jesus as the Son of God. Luke describes Martha as “burdened with much serving” (Luke 10:40). About Mary, seated, listening to Jesus, Martha complained, “Do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving?” Jesus’ response, “Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things . . . Mary has chosen the better part” (10:41, 42), suggests to some the superiority of the contemplative life, leaving the rest of us, supporting families, earning livings, (helping others?), as second-class Christians. But Luke introduces Martha and Mary immediately after Jesus’ parable of the Good Samaritan, whom Jesus recommends as a model of practical compassion, concluding, “Go and do likewise” (10:37). Go and do! Sit and listen! Discipleship is never either/or but both. Jesus ministered in prayerful silence *and* hospitable service. Monastic calendars add Martha’s sister, Mary, and brother, Lazarus, calling all three “hosts of the Lord”; patroness of housewives, waiters and waitresses.

Wed, Jul 30: St. Peter Chrysologus, Bishop, Doctor.

Peter, died c. 450; called “Chrysologus” (“of golden speech”) for his exceptional preaching ability; one hundred and seventy homilies are extant; bishop of Ravenna.

Thurs, Jul 31: St. Ignatius of Loyola, Priest.



Ignatius, died 1556; soldier, founded the *Compañía de Jesús* (Latin: *Societas Iesu*); approved by Paul III, 1540; authored the *Spiritual Exercises*; founded the Roman College; at his death, the Society numbered 1,000 members in seventy-six houses in twelve provinces, including Brazil, Japan and India; devoted *ad maiorem Dei gloriam*; today numbers some 14,840 members, patron saint of retreatants and soldiers.

Fri, Aug 1: St. Alphonsus Liguori, Bishop, Doctor of the Church.

Alphonsus, died 1787; lawyer; founded (1732) the Redemptorists, today numbering some 4,785 members; opposed Janenism, stressing Christ’s love (“*copiosa apud eum redemptio*”) and Mary’s intercession; bishop of Saint’ Agata dei Goti; master of moral theology; patron of confessors and moral theologians.

Sat, Aug 2: St. Eusebius of Vercelli, Bishop; St. Peter Julian Eymard, Priest.

Eusebius, died 371; considered the founder of the canons regular in the West; defender of St. Athanasius (May 2); exiled to Palestine by Constantius; with St. Hilary (January 13).

Peter Julian Eymard, died August 1, 1868; born at La Mure d’Isère, France, February 4, 1811; founded (1856) the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament, today numbering some 885 members, devoted to the worship and apostolate of the Eucharist as the center of the life of the Church and society; in 1858 founded the Servants of the Blessed Sacrament, the Association of Priest Adorers, and international Eucharistic congresses.

Each person is accepted where they are in their faith journey and moved along at an appropriate pace in a warm, accepting environment. We will begin on Sunday, September 7.

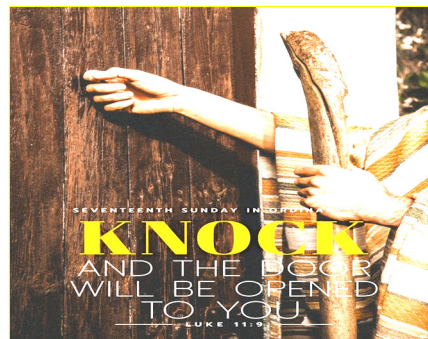
